Baton Rouge

Louisiana Art and Science Museum/Planetarium – Housed in a historic railroad depot on the banks of the Mississippi in downtown BR; includes changing fine art exhibitions, planetarium sky shows, Ancient Egypt Gallery, Museum store and more. 100 S. USS Kidd – America's only destroyer restored to WWII era, Old Ironsides Exhibit, largest model ship collection in the South. Open daily, 9-5. 305 S, River Rd. 342-1942. www.usskidd.com. Rural Life Museum and Windrush Gardens – 19th century outdoor complex of 30 LA plantation buildings on 5 acres divided into the Barn, the Working Plantation, and the Folk Architecture section. Louisiana's oldest museum to interpret slavery. Windrush Gardens cover 25 acres representing flora used in 19th C. plantation gardens. Magnolia Mound Plantation – a French Creole Plantation c. 1791 listed on the National Register of Historic Places and accredited by the American Association of Museums including open hearth cooking demonstrations, a slave quarter house, overseer's house, and museum store. Open M-Sa 10-4, Su 1-4. 2161 Nicholson Dr. 343-4955 <u>www.magnoliamound.org</u>. Tours on the hour, last tour at 3. Bordered on Nicholson Dr. by Terrace Ave. and W. McKinley.

Bluebonnet Swamp – 101 acres housing a 9500 sq ft building filled with live animal exhibits and wooded carving displays. The grounds feature local flora and fauna including birds, mammals and insects. Open T-Sa 9-5, Su noon-5. 10503 North Oak Hills Pky. 757-8905 <u>www.brec.org</u>. Admission: 65+ \$, Adults 18-64, \$.
